One Maple Creek School tradition is participation in the annual Ocean Day beach clean up and group aerial photograph, which will happen on June 3rd this year. Morgan Ingraham from Friends of the Dunes came to Maple Creek School to teach the students about the importance of clean oceans and how they can help. Morgan showed the kids photos of the Humboldt Bay region, the spot on the South Spit where the Ocean Day activities happen, and taught them about the importance of reducing, reusing, and recycling human-made materials. She showed the students how to pack a trash-free lunch for the Ocean Day event— use containers that can be washed and reused, metallic water bottles and cloth napkins.









Maple Creek School Receives Several Grants

Thanks to the efforts of the Maple Creek staff and school board members, Maple Creek School District continues to bring in grant money to improve the school and community.

High-speed internet is coming to the Maple Creek community through the Broadband Infrastructure Improvement Grant (BIIG). This grant provides for one-time funding in the 2014 -15 California State Budget Act (Senate Bill 852) to enhance "last mile" connections for school sites. This includes special construction costs of \$455,333 as well as equipment costs that could run up to \$35,500. This is a great opportunity to increase the bandwidth to the school. It brings fiber to the whole community that would not otherwise be economically feasible by the Service Providers in our area. In addition to the faster speed of the connection, student will be working on a more reliable connection. This will greatly enhance their education by broadening the information they can reach.

The Humboldt County Department of Health and Human Services awarded Maple Creek School a grant to purchase violence prevention/communication curriculum and to provide four enrichment field trips over the summer vacation to enrolled students who plan to return to the school in August. Be on the look out for more information about these field trips.








Recycling at Maple Creek School

The MCS Fundraising Committee, students and staff thank you for your participation in this new program.




GODWIT DAYS

20th ANNUAL SPRING MIGRATION BIRD FESTIVAL

Extraordinary Birding from the Redwoods to Humboldt Bay

Teachers, students, and parents are cordially invited to enjoy the Godwit Days Spring Migration Bird Festival April 17-19, 2015 at the Arcata Community Center. Celebrating the Arcata Marsh and Wildlife Sanctuary, redwood forests, ocean beaches, fern-covered canyons, rugged dunes, and the west's largest coastal lagoon. Godwit Days is held at the height of the spring migration when thousands upon thousands of birds congregate on the wetlands, river estuaries, and mud flats of Humboldt Bay.

What's a Marbled Godwit?



Did you know that ...?

Humboldt Bay is the main winter home for the population of Marbled Godwits (*Limosa fedoa*) that migrate to the tundra in Alaska in the spring to lay their eggs and raise their young.

Godwits are shorebirds, more closely related to gulls than to herons or egrets.

Godwits, using their long bills, probe the mud for shrimps, clams, and worms at low tide when the mudflats are exposed.

Godwits are the second largest shorebird on Humboldt Bay, after the Long-billed Curlew.

Godwits' bill color changes from pink and black to orange and black during the breeding season.

Bird Fair with commercial vendors and information booths from nonprofit groups and government agencies — Opening reception & lectures by Green Diamond Resource Company and this year's Spotlight Organization, Friends of the Arcata Marsh — Display of Humboldt County student bird art contest entries — Kids' birding walks at the Marsh — Family nature craft activities sponsored by Friends of the Arcata Marsh — Owl pellet dissection & art workshops for kids — Field trips for the entire family to Lanphere Dunes, Patrick's Point State Park, Humboldt Lagoons State Park, Humboldt Bay National Wildliffe Refuge, Ma-le'l Dunes/Humboldt Coastal Nature Center, and Arcata Marsh — Native plant walk — Binoculars/scopes lecture

<u>Humboldt Wildlife Care Center (HWCC)</u> -- Come see live birds of prey without any barriers at the Arcata Community Center throughout Godwit Days. These raptors, ambassadors of their species, can no longer survive in the wild because of injury. Meet the dedicated professionals and volunteers who care for these birds.
