


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Writer's Workshop



Science Fair Projects

Maple Creek students are busy learning how scientists work. Each of the seven Older students has chosen a specific topic of interest to study from mummification to finding the best recipe for marshmallows. One student is learning about heat transfer while another is studying surface tension; one student is exploring the concept of volume while another is experimenting with how distance affects the rate at which a line of dominoes will fall. One student is learning to create electronic textiles, an engineering project rather than a science experiment. The Younger students are following the scientific process to learn how and why objects sink or float.

The 2014 Doris Niles Science Fair is set for March 17-21. Maple Creek School will hold its science fair on Feb. 28 at 1:30 PM. We will need volunteers to serve as judges who will use a rubric to score individual projects with an emphasis on the science notebook.

Students who earn a chance to move on to the Humboldt County Science Fair need adults who are willing and able to help with the set up and take down of their projects at HSU and to transport students to HSU for interviews, if called. Here's the timetable for the county science fair:

- Monday, March 17, 9 am—Noon project set-up at HSU
- Wed., March 19, 9 am—Noon, 6th—12th grade students called to schedule interviews
- Thurs., March 20, 9 am—Noon, 6th 12th grade interviews
- Thurs., March 20, 4—7 PM and Fri., March 21, 9 am—3 PM public viewing
- Fri., March 21 3 PM—8 PM, removal of science project materials from HSU
 - Some requirements judges will score include (this is a sample list):
 - Log Book -
- Notes from background reading show extensive research prior to experimentation.
- Proper recording of all phases of the project with dates is present throughout log.
- Log book contains evidence of data analysis.
- Conclusions are based on data analysis.
- * A properly formatted bibliography cites references used.

Backboard -

- * Purpose or problem is clearly explained.
- Hypothesis is clearly stated.
- Dependent and independent variables are identified.
- Data is clearly and accurately recorded.
- * Experiment was repeated to establish validity.
- Conclusions relate directly to they hypothesis.
- Factors that could have influenced results are discussed.
- Relates project to real-world applications.

Peer Mediation: What it is and how it benefits students

Those of you who were able to attend the Winter Performance witnessed Peer Mediation in action in Santa's Workshop and in the Reindeer's Lounge. You may not have realized that peer mediation can be seen in action right here in Maple Creek. The older students received training that allows them to skillfully mediate minor conflicts on the playground and in the classroom. The younger students have learned the process and are eager to become peer mediators, too.

What is peer mediation?

Through peer mediation, trained students act as neutral third parties to moderate a process for resolving minor disputes and conflicts. The goal of mediation is for the conflicting parties to work out the problem constructively, moving beyond the problem to a solution that is agreeable to both parties. Within the process, each party has an opportunity to tell his/her side of the story and express feelings about the situation. An important part of the process is simply the opportunity to be heard and understood.

Not every problem is suitable for mediation. The bigger problems such as bullying, assault, or other criminal activities are left for the adults to solve.

What are the benefits of peer mediation?

- 1. Students learn problem-solving strategies that can transfer to future conflicts.
- 2. They develop positive communication skills, including how to appropriately express feelings and needs and how to actively listen without taking sides.
- 3. Students learn to take responsibility for their actions.
- 4. They develop confidence in their ability to help themselves and others.
- 5. The school climate improves as tensions decrease, providing more time and energy for the teaching/learning process.
- 6. Students and teachers work together in a friendlier, more relaxed environment.

Recess Before Lunch? MCS has made the change.



Great Public Schools for Every Student

Some schools say changing the traditional lunchtime schedule can decrease food waste and improve student behavior.

For generations of students, recess has always followed lunch, but around the country, a small but growing number of schools are questioning this long-standing tradition, noticing that scarfing down that PB&J before racing outside to play kickball can have negative effects on a student's behavior and health.

Proponents argue that eating first and then exercising can result in numerous nurse visits for headaches and stomachaches. Students excited about the opportunity to play outside rush through or entirely skip their lunch, leaving them hungry later in the day and creating more cafeteria waste.

Enter "Recess Before Lunch," also known as "Play Before Eat," a practice that aims to improve students' health and behavior by, as its name implies, having children play first and eat lunch afterward. A 2006 study reported that about 4.6 percent of U.S. elementary schools schedule recess before lunch.

What are the benefits?


Schools that schedule recess before lunch report that students eat more fruits and vegetables, drink more milk, waste less food, and are better behaved on the playground, in the lunchroom, and in the classroom, according to an article in the Journal of Child Nutrition and Management. Some schools also note a decrease in visits to the school nurse and more instruction time as benefits of the schedule switch.

"Kids are calmer after they've had recess first," Janet Sinkewicz, principal of Sharon Elementary School in Robbinsville, New Jersey, told <u>The New York Times</u> recently. "They feel like they have more time to eat and they don't have to rush."
