Daily 5/CAFÉ Comes to Maple Creek



Maple Creek School has a new system for learning to read and reading to learn—Daily 5/CAFÉ. This is a program based on research-based best practices for language arts instruction. It is designed to help students develop the habits and strategies needed for life-long reading and writing independence.

Daily 5 is the structured system of reading/writing behaviors from which students will choose each day. So far, we have practiced "Read to Self," Read to Someone," and "Listen to Reading."

We have a CAFÉ menu of strategies all good readers and writers use for comprehension, accuracy, fluency, and expansion of vocabulary.

Good readers use many of these strategies without thinking about them, so an important part of the program is modeling the strategies out loud, talking about when and how to use them and practicing them often.

When reading with a Maple Creek School student, ask him/her questions to "check for understanding." "Use the pictures" to "cross check" to make sure the sounds the reader makes match the "beginning and ending letters" in a given word. These are just a few examples of strategies we have been using so far.

To become an excellent reader, one must READ. Ask your child about the three ways to read a book. Even very young children can read. (Answer: 1. Read the pictures. 2. Read the words. 3. Retell the story.)

We expect all Maple Creek students to read every night. Please help your child to fill out the reading log and return it regularly.


