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Spotlight Shines on Ryan Sundberg

A collaborative writing experience by the 3rd—8th Grade Students

Would you like to learn about your county supervisor? Humboldt County 5th District Supervisor Ryan Sundberg made a second appearance at Maple Creek School's May Day Café; this time on May 1, 2017. He came early to talk to the 3rd—8th grade students. The students interviewed him and asked him questions about his personal life and what it's like to be a county supervisor.

Before Sundberg became a supervisor, he worked at a casino and at an airport hangar where he helped park airplanes. Later on, he was a member of the Trinidad Rancheria Tribal Council, which helped him with the tasks involved in being a supervisor. His business administration education also assisted with understanding the county budget of more than 350 million dollars.

People asked him if he would run for supervisor. In 2010, Sundberg was first elected to represent the 5th District of Humboldt County. He ran a campaign for a year before the election. He said his opponent raised over \$100,000, which was a lot more than his \$55,000. He did a lot of door-door campaigning and asked people for small donations. He asked what they wanted from the county supervisor. He listened to their concerns, so many voted for him. He won by 104 votes!

In case you don't know what a county supervisor does, here are some things Sundberg does for his district. He told the group that he gets 100 emails, 20 phone calls from, and 25 people in person who need help each day. Sometimes he goes out and fills potholes on private roads. He does other community service, such as the time he helped build a score board at McKinleyville High School and bleachers at Hiller Sport Park. He raised money for libraries. He currently belongs to the Mad River Rotary, which is an organization that raises money for community needs (the Mad River Rotary Club gives dictionaries to all 3rd graders in Humboldt County). He said out of the thousands of county workers, four work for him to help him do his job.

One important part of the supervisor's job is to work on the county plan. Housing is a significant component of the general plan. Sundberg helped to make building affordable housing easier. He assisted in taking out the solar shading rule and making it easier to build smaller houses on one property. Another important aspect of the general plan is economic development. Sundberg works hard to balance economic development with environmental preservation. Recently, Governor Jerry Brown appointed Sundberg to the California Coastal Commission. He said he would like to streamline the project approval process to help decrease costs, and he plans to honor his heritage by giving Native Americans a voice on this commission for the first time.

In addition, Sundberg supported Measure Z, which was to increase taxes to pay for additional law enforcement. It passed and added about a million dollars to the sheriff's department budget. Measure Z also helped with the county fire districts.

Although being a supervisor is more than a full-time job (sometimes people interrupt him during family outings to request help or talk politics), Sundberg plans to run for a third term in 2018.


Learning to Serve Others

I Went to Disneyland




I went to Disneyland and stayed at a hotel next to Disneyland. The hotel was very very cool, and it had a night lite, and it was stars.



Underground—A Realistic Dramatization of the Escape from Slavery By Jaylenne H.

"I've seen death, But them all stays the same, The drinking gourd Runs through the blue haze, The wolf howls out As he drags you to the grave, The Devil's scream Hounds you on the way," say songwriters Angelique Cineluand and Curtis Richardson who wrote the theme song for Underground, the hit television series. In the show, this song was on a wall of a shack where they kept slaves. It was meant for any slaves that came across the song to find their way to freedom though the lyrics. One of the main characters is named Noah. He was running away, but he got caught, and was put in a shack when he found the song. This starts the story of the slaves finding their way to freedom on the new television hit *Underground* on WGN America network. It comes on the channels 239 on Dish, and 307 on Direct TV. The show has a lot of violence, images, and events that might need a mature audience, but it's up to the parents to decide to show the history to a younger age or wait until they feel it's comfortable.

The Underground Railroad happened between the American Revolution and the end of the Civil War. The Underground Railroad was not a railroad at all; it was a network of stops where slaves that had escaped could hide. Anybody who would help the slaves escape and be caught would go to jail because of one of the laws at the time. It was a big deal if someone's slaves escaped. It showed people that the owner wasn't in control, and that the slaves didn't respect them. As soon as the owner found out, it wouldn't be long that there would be slave hunters after them and almost all of the time it didn't matter if they came back dead or alive.

Akiva Goldsman, executive producer of the show, said the intent is not to teach history, but rather to shed a light on the "truth of where we come from." The show tells many perspectives of the people of the Underground Railroad. There are the slaves who picked the cotton to the slaves in the house. There were even the slaves that were respected by the owners and played the role of the owner when he was gone, and all of them wanted to be free. The show tells that there were many different struggles and feelings happening at the time. Then there were the people (of any race) who helped save some of the slaves; they would suffer the consequences of going to jail or worse, being killed. That is why I feel that the T.V. show is a realistic dramatization of the historical record.

They bring new music into the show while they make it historically accurate. They have a unique way of bringing modern music into the show. John Legend is one of the producers. Also, his production "Get Lifted" is helping with the soundtrack and the music aspects of the series.

He said, "We didn't want to feel too stuck in the period. We didn't want music to make people

feel like they were going to a museum".

I feel that sometimes the music didn't seem to match the feeling and the text of the story, but most of the time they got it right. In the first episode, the main character (Noah) is running and the song in the background was "Black Skinhead" by Kanye West. In the scene, they show Noah running away in the dark with men running after him on horses because he escaped from his slave master. As they show him running, the song is playing in the background. The song is like a get you fired up song, so it would pull you in right away. Then while he's running, he stops and hides under a log and the song matches up with his breathing. It's almost as if you're with him, or you feel some sort of connection to the scene even though it's only the song's breathing matching up with his. That's an example of how they make the show more modern. If they chose different music, it could have felt just like another slavery show.

Even though the show is a dramatized, they have a good way of bringing it back to the history. Throughout the show, they tell the realistic struggles that everyone had at the time. In the second season, there is a slave named Darneil. As he works all day, he finds any fragments of paper he can, takes the pieces of paper home, and teaches himself how to read. People felt if the slaves were educated, they would start to get an idea of how badly they were treated or write their own freedom papers (which they did in the process of finding their freedom in the show). As Darneil learned to read, he began to learn how to write. There is one scene where he's talking to his partner about how he's been learning how to read and write. He wrote on a piece of paper: love, and his partner doesn't know what it says. He says this is how I feel about you. It is this really emotional moment where you see this connection between two people who live in horrible times. She says, "I will keep this forever" and looks at it and rips it to pieces. She tells him it's too dangerous. At the time, there were many laws against teaching African-American how to read or write. With all of the historical connections with every moment, it's teaching people about our history and its connection.

"If knowledge is power, slaveholders were determined to keep their slaves in ignorance," says a WGN representative in a piece that shows the history behind one of the scenes.

With every show that's ever made, there's always some people don't like it. One critic from Slate said, "We turn to these mediums knowing they can hurt, but leave us bettered for having spent time in the company of something excruciating and true. We don't, historically, turn to TV for this."

Yes, I know that we don't go to the TV for a history lesson, but these days, kids are using fewer and fewer books, and sometimes a TV show is a good way of showing kids some history though entertainment.

Slate also said, "Underground's provocative premise is shortchanged by a corny and anxious tendency to goose the narrative."

I understand that sometimes people add extra dramatic effect to a show, but sometimes the dramatic effect is true.

Also, from Metacritics, there was this one review from a person who saw an episode of the show. The viewer said, "Disgraceful. What a way to further escalate racial hate and keep blacks hating whites in 2016..."

I understand why this person feels this way because as an African-American, when I watch this show, it makes me look at how horrible it was, but it's important to remember that this happened to all races, and, yes, it makes you mad and hate the people who did it, but it's important to know about everyone's history

This show is smart about how they make it appeal to the people of today. They have smart historical context but keep it interesting with the drama. Also, I love the way they bring the sound of today to it and make it appeal to Millennials. That is why I love this show, but you would have to watch the show to find out for yourself.

Do Video Games Affect Kids As Bad As People Say They Do?

People say that video games affect teens in a negative way; that's true, but not as much as people think they do. They actually help teens in more ways than you probably think. According to a study published in *Pediatrics*, researchers found that one hour or less of video game play per day is associated with children and teenagers ages 10 to 15 being happier and more satisfied than those who do not play at all.

Video games help kids with life skills and other useful techniques such as hand-eye coordination and learning how to cooperate. In online multiplayer games, researchers of North
Carolina State University observed more than twenty public gaming events and found out
that video gamers spend much time engaging in social behavior online or offline. Video games
also help relieve stress, and having a stressful day isn't fun. Video games also help students
learn math, spelling, manage resources, understand problems of the world, learn about animals and countries, and how to use maps. Video games such as Age of Empires, Civilization,
Assassin's Creed or Call of Duty (the first one and some parts of the second one) "can push
teenagers to become interested and read more about different times in history"
(netivist.org).

Also, video games have proven that kids are easier for communication. Bill Nye asked a gamer, "Does it make you more social or less social?"

Jonna Mae, a guest on his show, responded, "I feel like I'm more social now...in school I didn't have any friends...I didn't talk to anybody...But when I was in video games, I had a voice; I could be whoever I wanted to be."

Richard M. Ryan, C. Scott Rigby, and Andrew Przybylski, have examined individuals playing games. Their research demonstrates that perceived in-game autonomy and competence are associated with game enjoyment, preferences, and changes in well-being pre-to post-play. Bill Nye has said that when you win, your brain gets a jolt of dopamine that makes you feel good; it also makes you feel excited when you finish the game because when you are stuck on a certain level, and you keep dying over and over again, it makes you feel kind of depressed.

A study published in *Pediatrics* has found that kids who played in excess of three hours daily were less satisfied with their lives and had more difficulties both socially and personally than non-gamers. NYU Child Study Center's Parenting Institute says that video game addiction can be harmful if your child is unable or unwilling to participate in any interests or any other activities other than gaming. Some parents are trying to prevent that from happening by limiting time per day for a child to be playing video games. According to commonsensemedia.org, weekly screen-time limits, limits on the kinds of screens kids can use, and quidelines on the types of activities they can do or programs they can watch.

People who think videogames are bad have also said video games that feature violent actions and scenarios might lead addicted players to be desensitized to the violence. Richard Gallagher, director of the NYU Child Study Center's Parenting Institute, states that players who become engrossed in first-person shooter-style video games, for example, may adopt a detached view of society or develop aggressive thoughts and tendencies. That's why parents are choosing the right video games for their children and/or trusting them to be mature about these types of video games and not act violently in real life. The researchers at the University of Texas at Dallas note some kids who play video games skip meals or lose sleep. Excessive game play, a video game addiction, can negatively impact a gamer's health. That's when it should be back to limiting the child's playing time. "I think the evidence is becoming increasingly compelling that there is a segment of people for whom gaming becomes a problem," says Dr. Shawn Green.

Bill Nye asked, "Is there something to addiction?"

Dr. Hillarie Cash, a guest on his show, replied, "I can tell you that the clients who come to reSTART [her clinic for video game addicts] are almost universally socially anxious, and they report that the years spent in front of the screen... [made them] feel social online... They feel kind of safe online, but out in face-to-face relationships, they actually feel less comfortable."

Dr. Shawn Green said, "Just because you're playing a lot doesn't mean you're addicted... if you're suffering some life harm because of the activity, and you can't stop even though you would like to, and it's something where...we need more evidence, but I think the evidence is becoming increasingly compelling that there is a segment of people for whom gaming becomes a problem."

Dr. Hillarie Cash asked, "At what age do drug addicts and alcoholics start their addictions... the teenage years...many of the guys we work with...started gaming pretty heavily when they were in elementary school....as a result, their development is being affected by it."

Violent video games do not make you a violent person. If you are a violent person, and you play violent video games, it might make you more violent than if you are not a violent person.

On one episode of his new show, Bill Nye asked, "Do violent video games make you more violent?"

Dr. Shawn Green was a guest. He said, "It's important to talk about what violence is. Violence is the far end of aggression. Aggression is a...willful intention to cause harm. Violence is...willful intent to cause severe body harm...The research shows that playing violent video games will move you a little on the continuum. It's an effect size that might change the extent to which you interpret a bump in the hallway, but it's not going to take someone who has no risk factors for aggression to interpret that bump as aggressive and then do something violent."

I have been giving examples about how video games are good and bad, or how they are helpful for a teen's social life and how they affect teens in a negative way. I decided to pick this topic because it was a way to express how I feel about video games and to explain to people how they are good and bad for a kid's health. though, video games are helpful for teens and other people in many different ways.

WANTED/NEEDED

We would love a digital scale for more accurate weight measurements during our science investigations/experiments. The triple beam balances we have provide an experience with the process of weighing materials, but they do not provide the accuracy budding scientists need.



Science Test Changes

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The State of California is implementing new science standards that describe the things we want students to know and be able to do. These new standards help students to think and work like scientists and engineers—asking questions and learning using hands-on investigation and discovery.

Working with science teachers, California is developing the California Science Test (CAST) that emphasizes scientific thinking and reasoning. These new tests will be **given in grades five**, **eight and high school**. As partners in your child's education, we invite you to take a look at some sample test questions available in the new CAST Training Test at http://www.caaspp.org/practice-and-training/index.html. We will be accessing these practice questions in the next month to give the students a preview of what to expect.

It's important to remember that statewide tests cannot take the place of hands on learning that is taking place in our school. Experiments, in-class assignments, and tests designed by your child's teacher all play a part in gauging what students know.

Statewide tests like the CAST are valuable because they represent a common yardstick—a way to measure the progress of all students at the same time in the same way.

Annual End-of-Year Testing

Dear Parent/Guardian,

In May, our **3rd-8th grade students** will participate in the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments, which are part of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) System. **Why is this test important?**

This test was created with teacher input to...

- * Measure how well your child has mastered the skills and content in mathematics and English language arts at his or her grade level
- * Align with the instruction that takes place in the classroom everyday

* Match the learning goals of each grade level

* Assess critical thinking, analytical writing, and problem solving skills, which are needed for success in college and a 21st century career.

The test has different kinds of questions, including traditional multiple-choice questions as well as ones that require students to explain their answers, show their work, and compose essays.

What should I expect after my student takes the test?

As you may remember from last year's score report, each subject will be broken down into areas. The report shows how students are doing in each area and where they need help. Depending on the student's needs, teachers can use this information to provide targeted help to students to address their needs.

Remember, the results from this test aren't meant to tell the whole story. Your child's scores are meant to be one of several ways for you and your child's teacher to see how your student is progressing in school. Test scores, along with student report cards and teacher's observations of your child's performance in the classroom, are used together to form a complete picture of your child's achievement.

Where can I learn more?

We encourage you to take a look at a practice test for your child's grade level. The practice tests are posted on the California Department of Education's Smarter Balanced Practice Tests Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/ta/tg/sa/practicetest.asp.
