Principal's Message

Stanwood A. Murphy Elementary is the only public school owned by a private company. This District has taught 5 generations of Pacific Lumber Company families and outlying communities nurturing a intimate learning environment.

Scotia Union School District is a single school district, consisting of Stanwood A. Murphy Elementary School. Stanwood A. Murphy Elementary is a kindergarten through eighth grade school, serving children in the community of Scotia, and extending south 26 miles to rural areas along the Eel River to Redcrest. Current school enrollment is 231. The district is experiencing declining enrollment due to lack of employment in the area. The district has been below maximum number of students per grade level prescribed by the state.

Stanwood A. Murphy has a staff of 10 regular education teachers, one music teacher, a speech/language specialist, one special education teacher, a Title I reading specialist, one full-time library technician, one teacher is also the vice principal, and a Superintendent/Principal for administration. Twenty percent of the teaching staff have advanced graduate degrees, and all are CLAD certified. We have an ELL coordinator who also teaches a Spanish elective in the middle grades. Our Special Education teacher is our GATE coordinator.

Scotia Union School District's elementary teaching staff is piloting Response To Intervention (RtI), a research-based reading and language arts intervention program that addresses 5 main reading skills. Teachers and literary technicians provide ongoing assessment and track student progress. Based on these assessments, students are assigned to specialized small groups, each focusing on specific reading intervention lessons. Our literary technicians are trained in both reading and math intervention by the teachers.

Our goal is to offer a rigorous research-based curriculum that prepares our students for high school. We accomplish this by implementing a middle grades specialized program offering the four core subjects (English, Math, Social Studies, and Science) taught by highly qualified teachers who have been approved by the Board based on our nation's No Child Left Behind teaching standards. Mrs. Dana Christine has a Masters in Music Education and received the California Music Association's Music Teacher of the Year (2006-2007) award. Mrs. Gossien received the Bank of America's 2007-2008 Stagecoach Award for outstanding teacher. Our departmentalized schedule is the only one in a single school district grades 5th-8th in Humboldt County. We are fortunate to be a small personalized school that offers programs similar to a junior high setting. In the morning our students are taught their four core subjects. In the afternoon, they experience Music, Physical Education, Reading/Math Intervention and enrichment activities. Students rotate in the upper pod complex which makes transitions quick and easy to monitor. All 5th-8th graders receive binders and tabs to ensure uniform, organizational study habits.

Our food service continues to be refined. In addition to the lunch program, prepared with homemade ingredients, students are now offered Stanwood A. Murphy's Break-fast Program. They come to the cafeteria between 7:45 AM and 8:15 AM. Also, based on our students' Site Council survey, we now offer a salad bar at lunch. At the end of the school day, students who participate in the After School Intervention Program receive a healthy snack from our Food Service Program.





Textbooks and Instructional Materials

Stanwood A Murphy Elementary School continually reviews and updates its textbooks and instructional materials, in order to ensure they are appropriate to support our instructional programs. We are on a seven-year cycle with the state of California in the adoption and implementation of subject area textbooks and materials. This cycle enables Scotia school to keep pace with current trends, and provides our students with accurate and updated information. All students are provided a textbook in all subjects.

Murphy Elementary School encourages staff to use different instructional media to enhance the quality of the instructional program, and supplement the curriculum. Teachers have access to microcomputers in each classroom, math manipulatives, science equipment, a large library, televisions and VCRs in each classroom, in addition to video tapes and equipment, which can be obtained from the Humboldt County Office of Education, where the district contracts for library and audio-visual services. All classrooms have a computer that is Internet accessible and contains a CD-ROM drive.

October 12, 2006 was the date our District approved our Fourth Quarter Williams Report indicating all textbooks are in good condition and of most current state-adopted curriculum.

In Spring, we have a school-wide art show. In Winter and Spring, we have music concerts. The following are classes offered in the Visual and Performing Arts category for Stanwood A. Murphy Elementary School:

School Safety

The Scotia Union School District has a School Safety Plan in compliance with SB187. The plan is updated annually. Encompassed within the Safety Plan are policies dealing with school rules, discipline, and a dress code. Policies relating to school-reporting procedures for child abuse, suspension and expulsion, sexual harassment, and others relating to the reporting of violence are included. The Safety Plan also contains a Disaster Plan, and the School District's Transportation Safety Plan. Disaster drills are conducted during each school year, and often include the fire department and medical evacuation unit. Bus evacuation exercises are conducted annually. The school had no reportable crimes last year.

The School Safety Plan was last reviewed, updated, and discussed with the school faculty in August 2007.



Professional Development

Teachers have the opportunity to attend workshops given by individuals contracted by the Humboldt County Office of Education. When workshops are offered, teachers who feel the workshop would be beneficial or serve to enhance their teaching skills are allowed to attend.

For the previous three school years, we had three days each year dedicated to staff and professional development. In addition, every Wednesday (32 Wednesdays total), two hours are dedicated to staff development based on our School Plan's goals.

School Facilities

The Scotia Union School District provides a safe, clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. The facilities and the school grounds are maintained under the direction of a head maintenance/custodian/van driver. The supervisor is in charge of a maintenance assistant employed for eight hours daily, a bus driver contracted from the high school, and the two busses owned by the district. These custodial personnel do necessary maintenance during the day. Our custodial staff ensures that interior rooms and restrooms are kept clean and safe. We have never receive a formal compliant under the Williams Act. Additional space has been a requisite, and the district has purchased four portable classroom units, constructed a cafeteria, and a multipurpose room facility.

The district has a large library with a library technician. We are currently utilizing one of the classrooms as a computer lab, and it contains over 25 computers with CD-ROM drives and Internet connections. We have a computer technician who maintains, repairs computers, and assists GATE students in building computers.

The district has plans and policies in place to guarantee the safety of our students and personnel. These cover emergencies, such as fires, earthquakes, or disasters, and include policies regarding visitors to our campus. A modernized fire alarm system has been installed to adhere to American Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements. The locks on all doors were changed in accordance with the School Safety Plan, allowing teachers to lock the doors from the inside as well as from the outside. Door handles conform to ADA standards. All main entry doors can be secured electronically by a single switch in the district office. Fire, disaster, and lockout drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the year. Security cameras are posted throughout the campus to view any possible unsafe behavior.

The school grounds are wellmaintained and aesthetically pleasing, with flowers and shrubbery enhancing the appearance of the school. Graffiti has not been a problem, and the few instances where graffiti has occurred, it was immediately removed. Stanwood A. Murphy Elementary School was built in 1972.

California Standards Tests

For the 2007 STAR exam, students in grades 2-11 took an English-language arts and mathematics test. Students in grades 4 and 7 also participated in an essay writing test. Historysocial science tests were given to students in grades 8 and 11, and students in grades 5, 8, and 10 took a science test. Students in grades 9-11 who completed a Standards-based science course and/or history-social science course were given additional exams.

Because tests are meant to measure how well students achieve standards rather than how well they do compared to other students, the results are reported as performance levels. The five performance levels are:

- Advanced (exceeds State Standards)
- Proficient (meets Standards)
- Basic
- Below basic
- Far below basic

Students scoring at the Proficient or Advanced level meet State Standards in that content area.

California Physical Fitness Test

Each spring, all students in grades 5, 7, and 9 are required to participate in the California Physical Fitness Test (PFT). The test measures six key fitness areas:

1. Aerobic Capacity

- Body Composition
- 3. Abdominal Strength

- Trunk Extension Strength
 Upper Body Strength
- 6. Flexibility

To meet fitness standards, students must score in the Healthy Fitness Zone (HFZ) on all six fitness tests. 
Norm Referenced Tests
